# Heisey's Early Patterns Fandango No. 1201

- Heisey's first advertisement for glassware appeared in the January 1, 1896 issue of China, Glass & Lamps. The #1201 Fandango and the #1200 Cut Block patterns were shown.
- Pattern # 1201 was designed to resemble/simulate cut glass.
  - 1) Long deep cuts
  - 2) Fields of cut diamond points
  - 3) Fields of cutting that looks like cane weaving
- Heisey did not give pattern # 1201 a name. Minnie Watson Kamm referred to the #1201 pattern as "Diamond Swag. Ruth Web Lee, a 1930's researcher, called pattern 1201, "Fandango". Heisey Collectors of America adopted this name for the pattern.

# Heisey's Early Patterns Fandango No. 1201

- The production period for pattern #1201 is believed to be 1896 to 1906.
- Peak years were 1897 and 1898 with over 95 different items made.
- Fandango pattern #1201 items are not marked with the Diamond H trademark. – Loren Yeakley, Heisey News, January, 1972
- Fandango was produced only in crystal.
